
Stormwater NSW is **supported by the national association Stormwater Australia** and a strong network of state associations, in Queensland, Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

*Welcome to the Stormwater NSW
2019/20 Annual Report.*

Stormwater NSW started the year by setting some long-term goals that we felt would enhance the value we offer our members. We felt that by growing and broadening membership we could add value to the industry by demonstrating how integral the management of stormwater is to our way of life.

To deliver on our goals we concluded we needed to be more active in social media offering quality postings and interactions with our members and the broader community (e.g. <http://stormwaterNSW.asn.au/great-stormwater-education-animation-where-does-stormwater-go/>). To that end we have grown our LinkedIn following to 2,100 followers. I invite you connect with us through LinkedIn and follow our content more closely.

We took a conscious decision to partner with Ocean Protect to actively lobbying for change (<https://zerolittertoocean.com.au/>).

We sought:

1. Compulsory Regulated maintenance for all public and privately-owned stormwater treatment systems
2. A legal requirement that all new public and private developments fit and maintain effective stormwater treatment systems
3. A requirement that all existing developments fit and maintain effective stormwater treatment systems if they are not present
4. A removal of the cap on the stormwater "levy" to enable local councils to adequately fund stormwater management

Through continued effort we have established dialogue with State and Federal representatives including advisors in the Prime Minister's Office, advisors to The Hon Sussan Ley MP, Minister for the Environment and the offices of The Hon Trevor Evans MP, Assistant Minister for Waste Management and the Environment and The Hon Matthew Kean MP, NSW Minister for Energy and the Environment.

We were also very heartened by announcements from City of Ryde, City of Sydney, Burwood Council and Northern Beaches Council that they had set the lofty goal of Zero Litter to Ocean by 2030. I'd like to offer my congratulations to these councils for this strong commitment to the environment and encourage other councils to follow in their footsteps.

We established Memoranda of Understanding with the University of New South Wales and the Sydney Institute of Marine Science. These relationships have enabled us to improve our keynote speakers at Stormwater NSW events and will improve our education and training offerings in the future. Despite issues such as the summer floods and COVID-19, I am proud to say that the team has stepped up, with a successful webinar series on WSUD in July that saw us peak with over 350 participants. We plan to continue to deliver similar seminars into the new financial year.

Our Operation and Maintenance Manual was formally released in June and we continue to get strong enquiries about training offered to around the content of the Manual. I commend the manual to all in stormwater community and encourage you to get hold of a copy. I am confident it will assist you to understand your operation and maintenance more fully and provide you with the tools to get the best from your proprietary devices.

Finally, I'd like to thank the members of the Stormwater NSW Committee for volunteering their time and expertise. Your efforts are valued by me and the Executive, but more importantly by our members. I look forward to working with you all in the coming year.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT SERVICE CHARGE

Stormwater NSW committed to providing industry leadership on best practice stormwater management and in March 2020 we released our position statement on 'Sustainable Funding for Stormwater Management' to assist with our advocacy role (<http://stormwater.nsw.gov.au/advocacy/>).

We have been actively advocating to see changes made to the **Stormwater Management Services Charge (SMSC)** (also known as the Stormwater Levy), to increase funding for Councils for stormwater maintenance and other core sustainable stormwater related works. For the past 14 years the SMSC has not increased, as it's not linked with Consumer Price Index (CPI). This has left councils with limited funds to meet stormwater operational requirements as our cities and towns grow.

The current SMSC structure dates back to 2005, when Stormwater NSW worked with the NSW EPA to change legislation and regulations, imparting to councils the power to impose a SMSC to properties. Stormwater NSW continues to liaise with the Minister for Local Government's office to improve the administration of the SMSC. While no agreement has at this stage been reached to correct the SMSC for CPI, the Minister's door has been left open for Stormwater NSW to continue to approach them for future discussions. The position statement will assist in our discussions with local government and state government as we advocate for an increase in funding to enable sustainable stormwater management.

What we know

- ⦿ The SMSC has not increased, even in line with CPI, since its introduction in 2005
- ⦿ The SMSC, in most cases, is not sufficient for Council to maintain and operate its assets
- ⦿ Not all Councils levy the SMSC

What we have heard

- ⦿ Councils want to increase the SMSC at least in line with the stormwater charge levied by Sydney Water
- ⦿ It should be mandated that all Councils charge the SMSC
- ⦿ Councils want to use the funds to not only operate and maintain stormwater systems but to implement stormwater projects that have multiple benefits
- ⦿ Councils want more transparency and accountability how the SMSC funds are spent

So we encourage you to help us to help support the industry by joining our advocacy effort.

GUIDELINES FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF STORMWATER TREATMENT MEASURES

The long-awaited Guideline was released in March 2020 and were to be accompanied by a workshop series which was postponed due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Sales of the guidelines have been made to organisations in NSW, Victoria and Queensland with a hybrid workshop series planned for November 2020.

The Guideline has a strong focus on the cleaning of primary treatment devices, with data sheets and cleaning guidelines currently being finalised. The Guideline can be referenced by GPT cleaning contract tenders released by Local Government and private industry and will become an important training tool for all people that undertake the maintenance of primary treatment devices.


SOCIAL MEDIA AND WEBSITE

The Stormwater NSW website is the interface between the organisation and our members. It provides the mechanism to share resources and news, apply for membership, buy our products, look at our conference proceedings and book into training programs. In the 19/20 year we posted 20 news articles, including a new initiative where we are interviewing members of the Stormwater NSW committee, about their career and interests.

Over the past 11 months since appointment of the 2019/20 Stormwater NSW Committee, we have made a concerted effort to increase our presence on social media. We use this presence to position Stormwater NSW as a source of industry relevant knowledge sharing and advocacy and as a supporter of the great work that other stormwater related organisations and individuals are undertaking.

Identifying that our primary and most active follower base existed on LinkedIn, we made the decision to focus our efforts there. By dedicating one of our committee members to the task we have been able to better manage new follower requests, comments and messages as well as expanding the diversity of our LinkedIn posts from marketing Stormwater NSW events and advocacy to posting regular interesting and topical articles and helping to promote events and the great work of some of our associate and member organisations. This effort has seen our follower base increase by over 500 people with average views of over 1300 people per post. These efforts will be continued and ramped up in the following year in concert with membership drives in an effort to convert followers to new association members.


MOUS AND THE STATE OF WSUD IN NSW INDUSTRY ENGAGEMENT WEBINARS

Late last year and early this year, Memorandum of Understandings (MoUs) were signed off with UNSW and the Sydney Institute of Marine Sciences (SIMS). The purpose of these MoUs is to begin to redress the fragmented nature of the industry and increase collaboration between Stormwater NSW and other entities with similar goals. In this way, we hope that our waterways and urban development, which currently lack sufficient state government attention and policy support, will get more attention than they currently do. The first collaborative event, 'The State of WSUD in NSW', took place on the 15th and 22nd July, in the form of an industry engagement webinar with four Q&A style panels, followed by a general interactive session where everyone was encouraged to contribute. The purpose of the forum was to gauge where NSW is at, as an industry, concerning the adoption of Water Sensitive Urban Design (WSUD), and to gain an understanding of the challenges and barriers accordingly. The completion of this event marks the beginning of an ongoing program of industry capacity building and advocacy.

This will begin with the production of a white paper based on the engagement process that will be co-authored by Stormwater NSW and UNSW. We would like to thank UNSW for its collaboration on this, and SIMS too for providing session panellists. A key goal for the year to come is to further engage with these entities, and reach out to others to grow an industry 'community of practice' so, together, we can speak with one voice, and drive sustainable stormwater management and waterway protection in NSW. Given that over 200 professionals took part, the white paper derived from this event will carry much greater authority than one produced by just a few authors. Accordingly, this white paper will be specifically addressed to relevant state government authorities and made publicly available.

STORMWATER NEWSLETTER: STORMCAST

Stormwater NSW joined forces with Stormwater QLD in March 2020 to produce a joint monthly newsletter for its membership. The newsletter provides the latest news and events from both Stormwater Queensland and Stormwater NSW to give their members a broad insight into our industry and association across the nation.

2020 TREASURER'S REPORT

The Committee is of the view that Stormwater NSW (SNSW) is sound financially and continues to successfully trade and meet its statutory obligations.

Since FY11 GEMS have provided secretariat services including financial services to Stormwater NSW. These services continued in FY20 and continue to be provided to SNSW in a highly professional manner. GEMS is commended for the timely, detailed and accurate financial reporting that the Committee continues to receive. The accounts have been audited and the auditor report is attached.

Over the last 15 years, SNSW's equity increased until FY10, then decreased in FY11 and then progressively increased each subsequent year to its highest level in FY18. In FY19 our equity declined due in part to funding an IWC Leadership Scholarship and funding of the preparation of O&M guidelines. In FY20 our equity increased slightly in comparison to FY19.

The major sources of income disclose the following trends:

- ④ Individual memberships for FY20 declined slightly in comparison to FY19;
- ④ The corporate memberships for FY20 increased slightly in comparison to FY19;
- ④ Overall the membership income increased slightly by \$342 (0.63% increase).
- ④ Stormwater NSW did not receive any grants in FY20.

Membership dues remain the single greatest source of income (74% of overall income). Maintaining this level of income requires a level of effort by GEMS including the timely issuing of membership renewals and effort in following up the renewals.

Another trend has been the fluctuating income from conferences and events as a major source of income which is a reflection of the challenges in attracting attendees to our conference and events in an increasingly crowded calendar, the financial constraints faced by some members and the extended time it can take to finalise conference accounts and disburse any surplus income.

The FY20 income was reimbursement of seeding funds.

The major expenses disclose the following trends:

- ④ The National Levy remains a significant ongoing expense;
- ④ The cost of secretariat services was higher than FY19 (31% increase) but comparable to costs in FY17 and FY16

Other major expenses included:

- ④ Event expenses
- ④ Accounting costs

The accounting costs we significantly higher than in previous years primarily due to the preparation and lodging of a number of historical returns in response to request received from the ATO.

The Stormwater NSW financial reserves include two separate accounts as follows.

- ④ Account 50256892 - Balance as at 30 June 2020 of \$38,664.
- ④ Account 50248913 - Balance as at 30 June 2020 of \$59,113.

The interest earned on our accounts was \$471 which reflects the current very low interest rate environment.

The financial challenges for Stormwater NSW in the coming financial year include:

- ④ Through demonstrated benefits to retain our current membership in these challenging times;
- ④ To deliver Stormwater NSW Seminars in new ways which delivers benefits to our members and is viewed as a valuable benefit of membership;
- ④ To identify and implement initiatives which generate income from non-traditional sources or activities;

Given the current challenging times, Stormwater NSW is in a strong financial position which will allow it to partially draw down its financial reserves in a controlled manner, if needed, to support the delivery of services and content to our members in FY21.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with relevant Australian Accounting Standards and the disclosure requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981. The accounts of the Association have been prepared on an accrual basis, with the exception of membership and conference income, which are recorded as income when billed, and are in accordance with conventional historical cost principles.

The Association is not a reporting Association because, in the Committee's opinion, there is unlikely to exist users of the accounts who are dependent on general-purpose financial reports of the Association for information. These accounts are therefore a "Special Purpose Financial Report" prepared so as to comply with the requirements of the Constitution and to provide information required by the members. The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies, adopted by the Association in the preparation of the accounts, which have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

(a) Income tax

Stormwater Industry Association of NSW is a not for profit membership organisation and the income tax is determined by the Mutuality Principle. It is based on the proposition that an organisation cannot derive income from itself. The principle provides that where a number of persons contribute to common fund created and controlled by them for a common purpose, any surplus arising from the use of that fund for the common purpose is not income. This principle does not extend to include income that is derived from sources outside that group. Therefore the income from sources outside the group and the associated expenses are used to determine the tax liability.

(b) Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE)

Plant and equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(c) Cash and cash equivalent

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of six months or less.

(d) Revenue

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(e) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

2. LEVY PAYABLE TO NATIONAL STORMWATER INDUSTRY ASSOCIATION

In accordance with Clause 23 of the "Protocol for the linking of the SIA Associations", SIA (NSW) must forward an annual subsidy levy per membership to the National SIA Association based on the number of financial members registered each quarter.

3. CAPITAL COMMITMENTS

There were no contracts entered into for future capital expenditure in the current financial year.

4. CONTINGENT LIABILITY

No contingent liabilities existed as at 30 June 2020.

5. MORTGAGES, CHARGES AND SECURITIES

At 30 June 2020 there were no mortgages, charges, or securities of any description affecting any of the property.

6. EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO BALANCE DATE

There are no items or events of a material or unusual nature that have occurred since 30 June 2020 which should be disclosed.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE STORMWATER INDUSTRY ASSOCIATION OF NSW

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Stormwater Industry Association of NSW. (the "Association"), which comprises the balance sheet as at 30 June 2020, the income and expenditure statement for the year then ended and notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Committee's Responsibility for the Financial Report

The committee of the association is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report, and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW) and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The committee's responsibility also includes such internal control as the committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion of the financial report based on our audit. We have conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Association's preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control. An audit also includes evaluation the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

The financial report has been prepared for the distribution to members for the purpose of fulfilling the committee's financial reporting under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009. We disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the financial report to which it relates to any person other than the members, or for any purpose other than that for which it was prepared. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Independence

In conducting our audit, we have complied with the independence requirements of the Corporations Act 2001.

Basis for Qualified Auditor's Opinion

The nature of the activities of the incorporated entity is such that income received from membership, sponsorship and public events conducted during the year, representing a significant source of revenue for the Association, is recorded on a cash basis. The committee has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of cash sponsorships and public event receipts prior to their initial entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on whether all receipts have been properly recognised.

Auditor's Opinion

Subject to the above reservation, in our opinion, the financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Stormwater Industry Association of NSW as at 30 June 2020 and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW).

Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist Stormwater Industry Association of NSW to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.
